Past topics have included e-cigarettes, food insecurity, and ongoing library exhibits. Most


recently we wrapped up a series on farmer and food safety that we recorded on location at the Farm Progress Show.

## **Creating Educational Video: Putting the Pieces Together**

On September 24, 2015, the Library held a 60-minute pop up workshop to provide an overview of the process of making an educational video.

Videos will be used in the new third year curriculum beginning in July 2016 as resource material for students to view at times and places of their choosing.

Five stations, Planning, Recording, Editing, Sharing and Feedback, were set up and supported by faculty and students familiar with the particular step in the process.

Facilitators provided demonstrations while attendees rotated through each station. Much discussion and sharing of knowledge and ideas oc-

curred amongst the tendees and facilitators. Feedback was very positive. The Library is considering presenting the pop up again in the near future.

## New Classes Added This Fall

We've divided the previous Intro to Access class into two in order to more effectively cover Access' robust capabilities.

Introduction to Access: Interface, Tables, Forms, and Reports

This basic course covers the Access user interface, importing Excel spreadsheets, and modifying and using existing databases. After taking the workshop, participants will be able to create and edit database tables and forms, add new data to an existing database, and create reports from database

#### Intermediate Access: Oueries and Database Theory

The second course includes basic terminology, organization, and best practices for database design. Learn how to create simple and complex queries to combine information from multiple tables and dig deeper into your data. Participants should feel comfortable with the material presented in the Introduction to Access class before taking this course.

**Excel: Pivot Tables & Charts** 

An Excel pivot table is a tool

for summarizing your data in a simple format. Use just the data and fields that you need to answer a question. Reuse the same pivot table to answer different questions by rearranging it. Participants will learn how to create, filter, rearrange and format a pivot table and to create a pivot chart.

#### PowerPoint: Animations & Multimedia

This class will cover several types of animations and how to add video and audio clips to your PowerPoint presentation.

## Highlighted Resource: Wacom Bamboo Tablet

A wireless Wacom Bamboo tablet is a new addition to the equipment available in the CAVE.

The Bamboo was provided by Dr. Debra Klamen's Josiah Macy Jr. Foundation grant to assist faculty in enhancing their Khan-type videos for the new curriculum.

Khan Academy videos engage learners' attention with on-screen writing and drawing using a Bamboo tablet.

Draw or doodle on the tablet with the pen tool. The tablet

maps to your computer screen to display your writing and illustration. Use Camtasia software, available on the CAVE computers, to capture the action into a video.

If you plan to make a video using the tablet, allow time to practice first and get used to using it. We recommend trying the eye-hand coordination exercise in the manual and adjusting the settings to find the pen pressure that works best for you.


