Life and Limb Exhibit Coming: March 19-April 28, 2012



The Medical Library will be hosting the travelling exhibit: Life and Limb: The Toll of the American Civil War from March 19 through April 28, 2012.

More than three million soldiers fought in the Civil War and more than half a million were killed; almost as many were wounded.

Produced by the National Library of Medicine (NLM), this exhibit highlights the experiences of soldiers injured during the conflict and their years thereafter.

PUBMED Central, http://www.ncbi.nlm.nih.gov/pmc/ is a digital archive where scientists submit final peerreviewed manuscripts to

ensure public access to published results of NIH funded research.



Caduceus Journal Now Online

Through a grant from the Consortium of Academic and Research Libraries in Illinois (CARLI) to the Medical Library, the Department of Medical Humanities' journal: **Caduceus: A Museum Quarterly for the Health Sciences**, has been digitized and is now available through the Internet Archives (IA).

All issues of Caduceus (http://goo.gl/09FpF) are available free in multiple formats, including IA's read online, pdf, epub, and Kindle, among others.

Caduceus was published from 1985 through 1997 and is indexed in PubMed.

Good Reads

Here are some recent additions to the Medical Library's collection.

Schenck, David and Churchill, Larry. Healers: Extraordinary Clinicians at Work.
Oxford: Oxford University
Press, 2012.
[W 62 S358h 2012]

Schenck and Churchill present research on healers and healing. "Healing, whether ordinary or extraordinary, and sometimes both, always has to do with the quality of relationship." (xiii) The first chapter details eight things the best clinicians do. Here's the brief version; more detail can be found in the book: do the little things; take time; be open and listen; find some-

thing to like, to love; remove barriers; let the patient explain; share authority; be committed and trustworthy.

Hill, Sophie. The Knowledgeable Patient: Communication and Participation in Health [A Cochrane Handbook]. Oxford: Wiley-Blackwell, 2011. [W 85 K73 2011]

Contrasting with Schenck and Churchill, this book provides readers with tools to "understand the central role of communication and participation to a well-functioning health system.... It places communication and participation firmly in the future of evidence-based healthcare." (xi)

Taylor, Robert B. Medical Writing: A Guide for Clinicians, Educators, and Researchers, 2nd ed. New York: Springer, 2011 (available in print and as an e-book). [WZ 345 T235m 2011]

This practical handbook aspires to make the reader a better writer. It follows basic writing advice and includes chapters on writing review articles, case reports, book chapters, research protocols, grant proposals, and clinical studies. The appendix of proofreaders' marks may be valuable to anyone encountering them for the first time.

Featured Resource: DynaMed and DynaMed Mobile App



The Library, in conjunction with the Department of Family and Community Medicine, has added a subscription to DynaMed. DynaMed is a point of care tool providing more than 3,200 evidence-based topic summaries.

Features of *DynaMed* include:

- Keyword searching as well as alphabetical by topic or category.
- Topics filtered by specialty or by topics that include updates that are most likely to change clinical practice.
- Access to more than 500 medical calculators.

- Level of Evidence labeling.
- Full text links through EbscoHost databases and the Cochrane Library.
- Drug information from AHFS.
- Patient education information.
- CME credit is available.
- Updated daily.

Web access to *DynaMed* is available through the Library's proxy server. A link has been added to the Quick Links list on the <u>Library's home page</u>.

Mobile App

DynaMed is also available as a mobile

application, compatible with

devices such as the iPhone, iPad, iPod touch, Android Smartphone, BlackBerry, Microsoft Windows Phone and Palm. Mobile app installation requires the following:

- 1. DynaMed serial number
- Access to the appropriate app store
- 3. Skyscape account (free)

Note: You need a serial number for each platform. For example, if you plan to install the app on an Android phone and an iPad you will need two serial numbers.
