

Dr. Ludmerer (M.D., Johns Hopkins) continues his trilogy on medical training (Learning to Heal: The Development of American Medical Education; Time to Heal: American Medical Education from the Turn of the Century to the Era of Managed Care) with this treatise on the development of residency training from its 19th century origins.


He contrasts the Golden Era of Osler's training with to-

day's work-hour restrictions, practice protocols, overordering of tests, and decreased public support. He sees both opportunity and challenge in today's health care environment arguing that "Parsimonious medical practice—doing what the patient needed, not everything that could be doneultimately is a learned habit" that will reduce costs and unnecessary complications, while increasing public trust.

Cassell, Eric. J. The Nature of Clinical Medicine: The Return of the Clinician. Oxford: Oxford University Press, 2015. W 61 C344n 2015

Dr. Cassell (M.D., NYU), author of *The Healer's Art*, began this book 20 years ago to address the art of caring for patients by clinicians, who are physicians "engaged in an endeavor unique in itself with its own methods, modes of thought, and pertinent information."

Starting with seven cases and a physician review panel, he put the book manuscript aside twice in the ensuing years. As growing attention focused on how doctors think, Dr. Cassell believed that "the time to teach the knowledge, skills, and habits of mind that were central to the work of the clinician" had come.

Highlighted Resource: Journal of Visualized Experiments



The Journal of Visualized Experiments (JoVE), is a unique resource that publishes video walk-throughs of experimental procedures and protocols.

Each video is 5-10 minutes in length and is accompanied by a written abstract, step-by-step instructions, and a discussion of the results. This format allows researchers to present their work more clearly than they could in a text-only article.

Important steps often get lost in translation in text-only explanations of protocols, which is what prompted Dr. Brandon Cox, Dept. of Pharmacology to publish an article in JoVE detailing a complicated dissection technique. And while she contends that in-person in-


struction is best, she frequently recommends students search JoVE when learning any new procedure. JoVE is linked through the Library's A-Z list and is available for both on and off-campus use.

How to Find JoVE Articles

SIU-SOM users have access to content in JoVE's Biology, Medicine, Neuroscience, and general collections. JoVE is linked through the Library's E-Journals A-Z list; search for "JoVE" using the "contains" search option and the results will the list the available sections.

JoVE articles are also included in PubMed search results. Please note, however, that there is an embargo on some of the most recent JoVE content. JoVE is accessible to SIU students, faculty and staff both on and off-campus with a valid SIUSM login and password.
