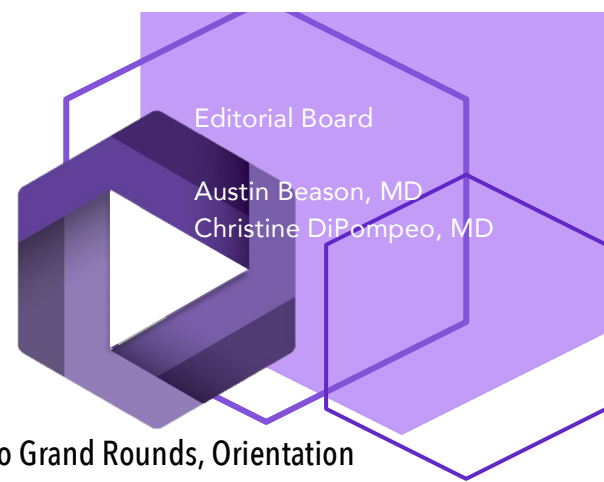


# SIU Division of Orthopaedics Newsletter

A New Orthopaedic Executive Council will be set up with membership from both OCI and Springfield Clinic to consider issues relevant to the Residency Program.

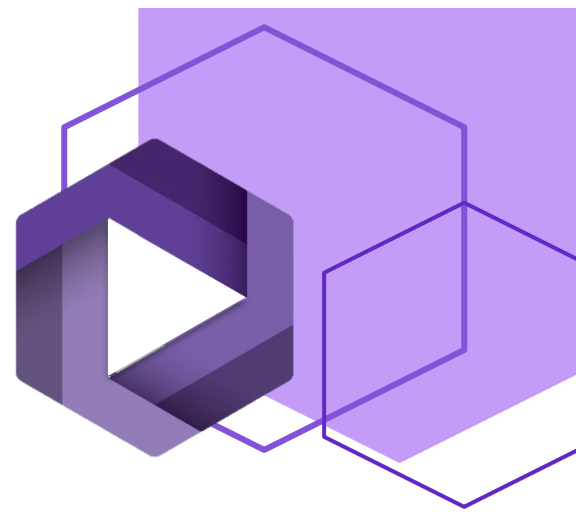
Young Faculty Development will be encouraged to involve younger faculty in education and research with residents.
